

A NOTRE DAME SATURDAY:

On October 16th, 6 Corvettes left Greg and Donna's house dark and early for a long Drive N Dine to the North Country. Attending this event were Greg & Donna Bowron, Jim & Jackie Bredle, Susie Hale and her friend Dana, Dick & Edla Hovermale, Barry Rector, plus Tom Sifferman and his friend Sandy. Barry had planned to make the trip with his son but his son just received deployment orders to Afghanistan and had to remain home to help prepare his troops for the assignment. We send our prayers and best wishes for a safe assignment for his son and his fellow troops and a speedy return home.

Donna had coffee and donuts ready by 5:30am and those that could pry their eyes open to find them partook of a little snack before departure. We hit the road about 6:10am with the temperature hovering somewhere around 36 degrees. Greg took advantage of the captive audience and had Notre Dame propaganda readily available. He provided each of us with a CD titled the "History of ND Football, part 1" which was a combination of the music from the ND Marching Band and a narrative of important games and events that helped form the ND tradition which was narrated by Regis Philbin.

The drive up was largely uneventful. Leaving that early beat the traffic so it was smooth cruising. There were even comments that the trip through Kokomo and its 5,389 traffic lights was duck soup that early in the morning! We followed the Vette ahead of us and let Regis keep us awake while we learned our history. Some of us refused to be caught in the ND lore as Dick Hovermale claimed they sung "Rocky Top" all the way up! Dick and Edla weren't the only good sports on this trip, Tom Sifferman is a Southern Cal man and ND and USC have been rivals since 1926! Both schools have a long and storied football tradition and clearly ND considers USC their biggest and most important rivalry game. His friend Sandy is from Texas and yet both purchased and wore Notre Dame sweatshirts for the trip!

We took a halfway break at Gallagan's truck stop that appropriately displays a shamrock at their entrance to boast their Irish heritage. A little pressure relief and a fresh transfusion of strong coffee and we were on our way north again. We hit a few miles of on again, off again ground fog that could have been out of a Steven King novel but we cruised on and soon broke free. After our stop the first rays of morning light began to filter through and that answered Jim Bredle's burning question of "You people that have to work, what the heck time does it get light these days?"

We arrived in South Bend a little before 9am and the temperature has warmed to a balmy 40 degrees. Greg took us in through a residential area to avoid traffic by turning east on North Shore Drive just after we crossed the St. Joseph River and then turning North onto Notre Dame Avenue. As we drove up Notre Dame Avenue towards the campus you could see the morning sun gleaming off the Golden Dome.

We parked at a private residence just about a block south of campus at Gene and Frances' home. Greg and Susie put their Vettes in Gene's garage and the rest parked 2 deep and 2 wide on Gene's concrete driveway. It cost us \$30 each but the cars were safe and secure and the rates elsewhere range from \$35 to \$50 per game for parking.

First order of business was to visit the coffee depository at the Eck Visitor center and then spend some money next door at the Hammes Book Store. These are conveniently located just about a block or so from the main campus entrance and right next to the on campus Cemetery. Greg and Donna own a small amount of real estate at this Cemetery but are in no big hurry to relocate.

After scratching the shopping bug at the Bookstore we walked over to Legends. Legends is an on campus restaurant and bar which is located on the south end of the parking lot just a scant 100 yards from fabled Notre Dame Stadium. The décor is not surprisingly all Notre Dame athletics and contains many televisions; some showing ND football highlights and some tuned to ESPN's Game Day show to cater to the football crowd. They serve a breakfast on game days only and control the crowd by charging a \$7 per person cover charge. This fee is then deducted from your food purchase so it really becomes just an advance towards your breakfast. Remember, this facility is located in the stadium parking lot and there is some serious tailgating going on all around. ND fans arrive early and stay late so the cover charge is very effective at keeping the crowd inside down and we were able to immediately get a table where we could all sit together. Breakfast was good but we did have our share of confusion between the waitress and the kitchen trying to keep the orders straight. Let's just leave it at we were pretty sure neither the waitress nor the cook met the entrance standards for the University.

After breakfast Greg took us on a tour of campus. We walked by the Stadium and into the Joyce Center. Unfortunately we were unable to see the basketball side of this twin-domed arena because it was Opening Day and the Irish were in the midst of their first practice session, which was closed to the public. We did see some of the trophy cases on the second floor that displays trophies won in all of their men and women athletic programs. There was also a display of their many National Championship rings won in football and a few other sports. A trip downstairs in the Joyce Center went by their hockey rink that will soon be replaced by a new hockey arena building on campus. From the Joyce Center we visited the Guglielmino Athletic Complex that is an extensive indoor training center with a large weight training facility and indoor football field. They have decorated the main entrance with their 7 Heisman trophies and numerous other football individual achievement awards such as the Vince Lombardi Award, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm Award, Maxwell Award, Walter Camp Award, Outland Trophy, Fred Biletnikoff Trophy, etc. etc. These trophies are on pedestals and out in the open where visitors can touch them and have their pictures taken with them. They also display here National Championship banners and a large Four Horseman statue. The current players as well as prospective recruits pass through this entrance and it serves as a reminder of the proud tradition and accomplishments by this University. Notre Dame football has won 11 consensus National Championships, various other National Championship awards in an additional 10 seasons and has enjoyed 22 undefeated seasons. They top the list on number of National Championships won, the number of Heisman Trophy winners, are a very close second in the all time winning percentage and are 3rd on the all time number of victories despite playing football for several fewer seasons than the two leaders. Notre Dame has arguably the most storied football history and the name is synonymous with college football.

Next stop on the campus tour was the Hesburgh Library. This is one of the more recognizable buildings on campus with its 14-story mural facing south and blessing the football stadium with raised hands that is commonly known as "Touchdown Jesus". A visit to the 13th floor gave us a bird's eye view of the entire campus cloaked in its autumn colors.

From the Library we went to the Administration Building with its real gold gilded Dome on the outside and beautiful architecture on the inside with polished woodwork structure and stairs, painted ceilings under the Dome and mosaic entrance halls. We exited just in time to see the ND team leave the Basilica where they had attended Mass together and then they walk the considerable distance to the Stadium along a pathway that is surrounded the entire distance with excited fans that are eager to cheer them on to victory.

Next stop was to light candles at the Grotto a short distance down the hill behind the Administration Building. A quick prayer for a departed loved one or other special intentions and we were back touring campus. From the Grotto it is a short stroll through the trees and flowers to St Mary's Lake and St Joseph's Lake and it was tempting to stroll the paths around them and further take in this serene campus setting but alas there is much to see and time is short! We settled for strolling back uphill for a short visit to the Sacred Heart Basilica. If you are on campus, please don't miss this stop. Pray if you wish but be sure to take in the stained glass windows, the painted ceilings, the gold altars, visit the entombed Cardinals and just plain absorb the beauty and grandeur of this facility!

After exiting the facility it was obvious that by then the campus is alive with fans, students, traditions, music and the building expectations of an Irish victory. The students were busy grilling and selling food all over campus and the aromas of charbroiled burgers and brats were tempting our taste buds! Some of us rested on a bench in a sunny spot beneath the glint of the gilded Dome and watched the fans enjoy the campus on a warming and beautiful autumn day. Some of us hustled off to visit the Rockne Memorial and pay homage to the man that started all of this tradition. This took us by the Notre Dame band that was delivering its pre-game on campus concert that helps fire up the ND faithful before each game. The music echoed throughout the campus and added to the effect as we visited the campus sights or admired them from a bench. From there some of us caught a free Usher tour on a golf cart around campus and got deposited at the Stadium. The rest of us joined thousands of fans and followed a game day tradition and the ND Band as they played and marched their way from the Golden Dome to the Stadium entrance.

Oh yes, did I mention there was a football game scheduled? We entered the Stadium in plenty of time to watch the teams warm up, see the ND Band take the field led by their Irish Guard and see the Irish team storm out of the Tunnel to the cheering of over 80,000 fans. ND expanded the Stadium in 1997 to raise the capacity from 59,075 to 80,200. They have had only one home game since October 24^{th} , 1964 that has failed to sell out (Thanksgiving Day, 1973). Most

of us sat in the south end zone upper deck under the watchful eye of Touchdown Jesus. The rest of us were in the north end zone upper deck keeping track of the ND students, cheerleaders and Leprechaun. All of us were basking under cloudless blue skies and enjoying near 70-degree temperatures! After the pre-game pageantry was finished the Irish wasted no time in waking up the echoes with an 80-yard touchdown pass on the first play from scrimmage. They were inconsistent most of the rest of the first half but took a 10-point lead into what apparently was a blistering halftime lecture from their Coach. They came out with an attitude adjustment in the second half and played a good third quarter before sending in the subs in the fourth quarter and eventually cruising to a 44 to 20 victory. A strange event happened late in the 3rd Quarter. After enjoying cloudless blue skies for the entire day, some clouds covered the stadium and opened up with several dozen large wet drops of water that quit falling as suddenly as they started. By the end of the game the skies were blue again! It was like the Big Guy was saying; "look what I can do!"

After the game we watched the team lift their golden hats in tribute to the green clad student body, listened to them sing the Alma Mater song and then we all returned to our Vettes. Gene was beaming as he had a great day guarding our cars and telling all his neighbors and passers by that they belonged to him and his 5 sons. He said he could have sold them all!

We made a quick exit out of South Bend and since we were all hungry (imagine that!) we stopped at Chili's in Kokomo for some conversation and a late dinner. Greg and Donna made it home about 11pm. Jim and Jackie had gotten up at 3:30am for the trip and by the time they got back to Martinsville it was indeed a very long day.

Greg and Donna really enjoyed sharing what for them has been a regular Notre Dame Saturday for over 40 years. As the folks on this trip may have learned there is a lot more to a college football game then just going to see a football game! The excitement and activities that you can do and see on campus make it more than just a game; it is a real event. Rather you sightsee or join one of the hundreds of tailgate parties there is much to keep you busy. They hope everyone enjoyed the trip and had a great time! It is unusual and perhaps a result of the poor economy that tickets were readily available to a ND home game this year but if tickets are available again next year they will certainly offer to host this event again.

THIS WEEKS TIP - How Should I Store My Products? (smokinvette.com)

The seasons are changing, cold weather is rolling in, and the average temperature in your garage is probably getting pretty low. So what does this mean for your detailing products? Should you store them any differently? If you don't is it bad? The fact is detailing chemicals, cleaners, polishes, waxes, and dressings are all very sensitive to extreme temperatures - both hot and cold. To that end its important to store your stuff somewhere safe, especially in the off season so its ready when you need in the spring.

- TEMP RANGE -We recommend that your chemicals be kept somewhere that's temperature controlled. A closet, laundry room, etc. you just want to make sure they're not falling below 40*. Beyond that chemicals can begin to change structure and be rendered useless. Nothing worse than pulling out your detail goods for the big spring cleanup and realizing it's all ruined!
- MAKE TRANSPORT EASY Cardboard 6 pack boxes make great holders for 16oz bottles! Plastic tubs with sealable lids or milk crates are cheap and make storing your supplies away easier, plus they'll be organized if you need them.
- CAP PLUGS At Adam's we ship all of our bottles with a red cap plug that seals the bottles during shipment. Keep these and reinsert them when they go into storage. They'll ensure the seal is airtight and product won't leak or dry out.
- LIGHT SENSITIVITY Some products are sensitive to extended or harsh light exposure. Don't store bottles exposed to harsh light, like in front of a window. If it can't be avoided put bottles into boxes.
- WINTER SHIPPING if you decide to order supplies during the winter months plan accordingly. Standard shipping options often mean a package will sit in a truck for days, if that truck happens to cross thru a cold area of the country freezing is a risk. To avoid this, select 2nd day shipping. Also request signature required deliveries if you won't be home... a package left on the porch in a cold area can freeze, making the products useless.
- ACCESSORIES Make sure all your towels, pads, and applicators are clean and store them somewhere safe. Keep them dust free and they'll be ready to go to work at the first signs of spring weather.
